Certificate in Intellectual Property, Media, and Information Law

Many Brooklyn Law School students express an interest in practicing in areas involving intellectual property, the media, and information law. To prepare them for practice, Brooklyn Law School offers a Certificate program. Students can take courses in all three streams, Intellectual Property, Media, Art, and Entertainment Law, and Information Law, but to earn this Certificate, students must select one of the sub-specialties and satisfactorily complete, at a minimum, the following: (1) 3 foundation courses, (2) at least 2 electives selected from the lists of advanced courses and seminar or specialty courses; (3) at least 2 skills and practice-based courses.
